What is EIROnline?

Created in 1997 by the European Foundation for the Improvement of Living and Working Conditions, *EIROnline* is a web-based database produced by the European Industrial Relations Observatory. *EIROnline* contains up-to-date data and analysis on developments in areas such as collective bargaining, social dialogue, employment, work organisation, industrial disputes, pay, working time and social partner activity.

Coverage

EIROnline contains information on events and issues in industrial relations in each of the 15 EU Member States and Norway, plus a European overview. A network of 16 National Centres and an EU-level centre submit information to the Foundation, where it is edited, processed and entered into the EIROnline database.

The data is divided into "in-briefs" and "features". There are also regular comparative studies, annual updates and an annual review. The information is easy to retrieve by searching or browsing by month or country. All articles are indexed.

Audience

EIROnline is targeted primarily at practitioners and policy-makers among the social partners, national governments and European institutions. However, the contents are equally useful for researchers and all those interested in European affairs.

Comparative studies

These are overviews on topics of major significance in EU countries. Recent studies have covered:

- teleworking
 - working time flexibility
 - industrial relations in SMEs
 - the Europeanisation of collective bargaining
 - the EU parental leave agreement and Directive
 - collective bargaining on employment
 - board-level employee representation
